8. Salmon In the Classroom (9-12th grades) North (\$2,398)

A new Chemistry, Honors Chemistry and probable Environmental Studies instructor at North wishes to create a Michigan Department of Natural Resources program where Chinook Salmon eggs are received and nurtured in the classroom for six months and eventually released into a local river. Students will be responsible for the feeding, cleaning and maintenance of the fish and the tank they are placed in.
